

# WAR AND SOCIETY

Did you know that the British Army has fought in conflicts all around the world for centuries? Over time, British soldiers have adapted to many changes, responding to new technology and sometimes to public pressure.

Your mission is to work as war correspondents travelling through the nineteenth century to investigate three conflicts: the Napoleonic, Crimean and Boer Wars. As you move through the galleries look closely at the objects so that you can collect evidence for your report. Remember, the public will want to know the truth!

This trail takes you to four different galleries in the Museum and you can visit them in any order.


#### The experience of war
