









REMEMBRANCE

The First World War took place 100 years ago but even today people remember what happened and commemorate the people who died.

Follow this trail to find out how and why people remember those who have served in wars.

This trail takes you to four different galleries in the Museum and you can visit them in any order.

IN **SOLDIER** GALLERY

Museums are great places to discover more about other people's lives and remember their stories.

Look to your right as you enter the gallery and find this jacket

It is over 200 years old and could have been worn by a boy as young as five. **What was his job?**





Do you think he was happy being in the Army so young? Discuss with a friend.

Go to the back of the gallery and find the child's dressing gown. (HINT: It's near the large armoured car).

Soldiers want to remember their time in the Army too. One soldier collected lots of military badges, sewed them on to this dressing gown and gave it to his son. What badge would you wear to help you remember someone or something? Draw your design below:

IN **ARMY** GALLERY

There are all sorts of ways to remember those who have served in the Army.

Go to the back of the gallery and look at the Women in the British Army display. Find this object

Use the touch screen to find out more about it. What is it called?

These were given to the families of every serviceman and woman who died in the First World War. This one was awarded to one of the first women to join the British Army. **What was her name?**

People also remember animals that have served in the Army.



Go to the left wall of the gallery and find the display about a famous mule who won medals over a hundred years ago.

What was his name?

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Draw a picture of him below:

Do you think it is right that animals should get medals? Discuss with a friend.

IN **BATTLE** GALLERY

Sometimes soldiers remember a battle they have been in by capturing things that belonged to the enemy.

Go into the gallery and turn left. Find the large horse skeleton. This horse belonged to the Emperor Napoleon and it was captured from him after the Battle of Waterloo. **What was the horse's name?**

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IN **SOCIETY** GALLERY

Today there are many charities that support ex-servicemen and women.

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Find the <u>Charities and support</u> display. (HINT: It's to the left of the poppy display at the back of the gallery).

Can you see three types of food and drink sold in support of soldiers' charities? Write the names below:

Find the multi-faith memorial markers. Draw any two of them below:
