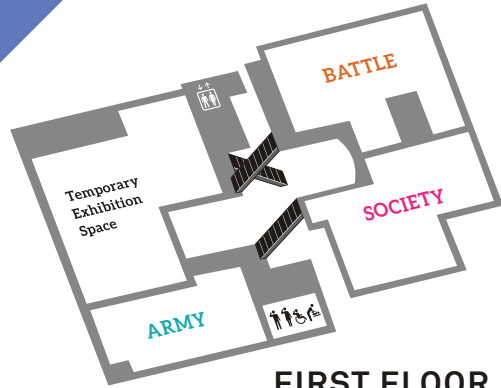

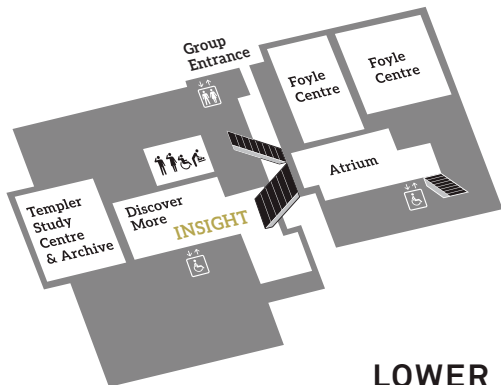

IN SOLDIER GALLERY

Museums are great places to discover more about other people's lives and remember their stories.

Look to your right as you enter the gallery and find this jacket ➤

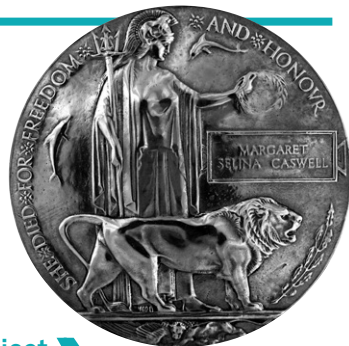
IN ARMY GALLERY

Where did the wood come from?

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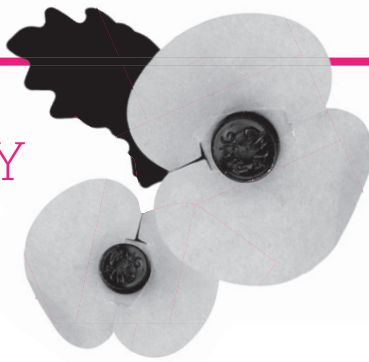

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Poppies are now a symbol of remembrance for many people of many different religions.

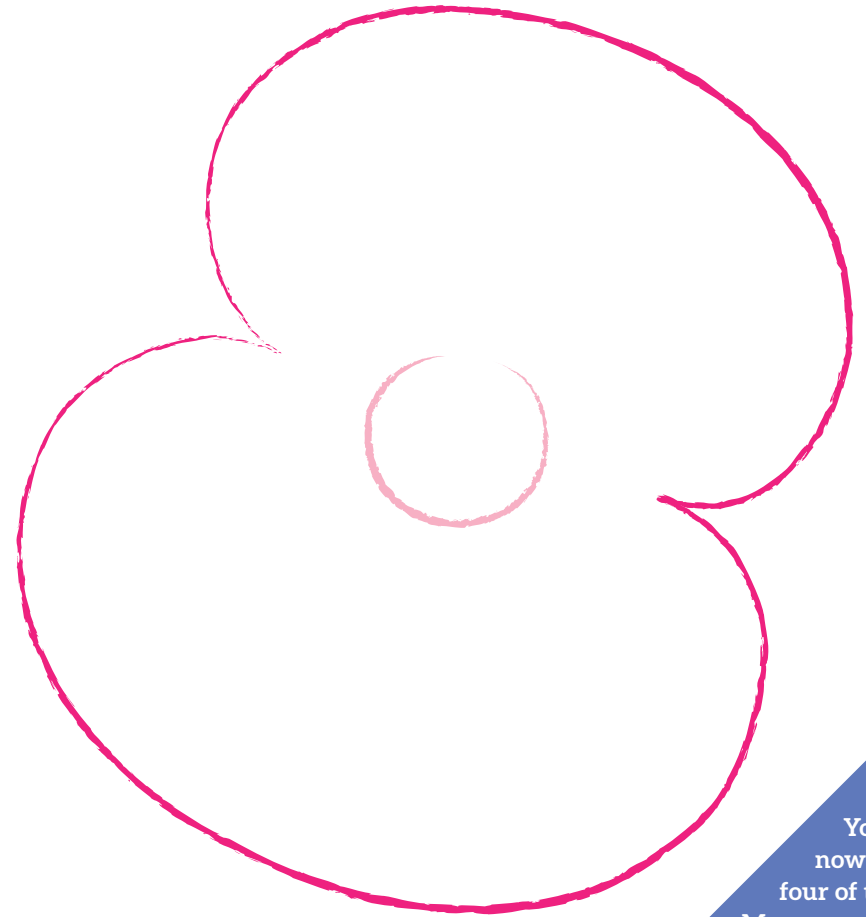
Find the multi-faith memorial markers. Draw any two of them below:
