During the First World War, soldiers had to carry this First Field Dressing with them at all times.

Soldiers use lots of clever equipment to protect themselves and to help them do their jobs.

Go to the displays about Modern warfare to find this object What is it? Who did it belong to?

IN **ARMY** GALLERY

There are lots of different jobs in the Army. Caring for sick and injured soldiers has always been a very important part of Army life.

Look at the uniforms in the middle of the gallery. Find the uniform worn by the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry. Use the touch screen to find out more. What did the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry do? Who wore this uniform? Why was she important? Now find the display of cap badges. They are all different – every regiment in the Army has its own unique badge.
