Britain, the Army and the Cold War: Interactive Timeline

Purpose and scope

The interactive timeline explores Britain's position in the Cold War through the role of the Army. From an occupying force tasked with rebuilding a decimated Germany with the wartime allies at the end of the Second World War, to a NATO fighting force engaged in constant training – even warfare in Korea – in the face of rising tension with the Soviet Union and the nuclear threat. The timeline features over 100 sources from the National Army Museum's collections including photographs, documents and artefacts, as well as video interviews with British Army of the Rhine veterans discussing Cold War Berlin and the Soviet threat. It is designed to be engaged with on various levels, whether for a chronological overview or for the study of a specific topic, theme or period. Within the timeline's stories, the level of engagement is determined by the user, with the option to read information segments, view objects and play videos, plus access further information through extended captions and links to articles on the National Army Museum website. The timeline can be used by students for both classroom or homework activities, and by teachers looking to further subject knowledge.
